Why do Catholics celebrate lent?

Catholics celebrate Lent as a season of preparation, penance, and reflection leading up to Easter, the most important event in the Christian calendar, celebrating Jesus' resurrection.

Lent lasts for 40 days (not counting Sundays), symbolizing the 40 days Jesus spent fasting in the desert while resisting temptation from Satan. This period mirrors significant biblical events tied to the number 40, like the Israelites' 40 years in the wilderness.

Catholics observe Lent by:

- Fasting and abstinence giving up certain foods (like meat on Fridays) or other comforts.
- Prayer deepening their relationship with God through reflection, confession, and attending Mass.
- Almsgiving showing charity by helping those in need, often through donations or acts of kindness.

Year 3 Trip to Blists Hill Victorian Town

We are thrilled to share the unforgettable experience our Year 3 children had on their recent trip to Blists Hill Victorian Town in Ironbridge. The children spent a full day stepping back in time to experience life as it would have been during the Victorian era, and it was an educational and fun-filled day that truly brought history to life.

Blists Hill is an open-air museum that recreates a Victorian town, complete with

cobbled streets, gas-lit shops, and traditional Victorian buildings. From the moment the children arrived, they were transported into a world of horse-drawn carts, blacksmiths, and bustling market stalls. The experience was so immersive that it felt as though they had actually travelled back to the 1800s.

The children were excited to explore the different areas of the town, including the

Victorian pharmacy, the bakery, and the sweet shop. They had the chance to see how people lived, worked, and interacted during the Victorian period, which perfectly complemented what they've been learning in their history lessons.

What made this trip so special was the way the children were able to learn through fun, hands-on experiences. They were not just passive observers but active participants in the Victorian world.

The trip also provided a fantastic opportunity for the students to bond as a class. They worked together in groups, helping each other with the different activities and sharing their discoveries along the way. It was wonderful to see them so enthusiastic about their learning, and we could see how much they enjoyed connecting with the past in such an immersive way. By experiencing the sights, sounds, and smells of the past, the children gained a better appreciation of how different life was for children in the 19th century compared to today.

At the end of the day, it was clear that the children had a fantastic time and had learned so much. They returned to school with excited stories to tell and a greater understanding of what they have been studying in history lessons.

Working in partnership

We reach out to you with warmth and a deep sense of understanding, seeking your support in a shared mission that is at the heart of everything we do: helping every child develop strong skills in reading, spelling, communication, and maths. At St. Mary's, our dedicated staff work hard to carefully select engaging texts, adapt maths teaching to meet the unique needs of every child, make learning fun, nurture a love for stories, and invest in high-quality books and reading schemes. We understand that

reading is not just a skill; it is a gateway to every child's future and success.

The reality is that children who read and practise maths regularly at home make noticeable and meaningful progress. While we are deeply committed to supporting children here at school, it is the daily practise at home that truly helps them flourish. Simple, everyday activities, whether it's sharing a book, counting objects around the house, playing number games, or spotting numbers in the environment, have a huge impact. These small moments of connection build fluency, confidence, and understanding, and are just as crucial for older children as they are for our youngest learners.

However, we have noticed that an increasing number of children are arriving at school without their reading books or diaries. In some cases, it is rare that reading is being done at home and diaries are frequently misplaced. Whilst we do as much as we can do to bridge this gap, through teaching assistants who listen to children who don't have regular reading at home, and through additional maths interventions, the number of children requiring extra support is growing.

In addition to reading, regular practise of homework, spellings, and times tables plays a vital role in laying the foundations for future success. At present, about half of our pupils complete these tasks consistently. We fully understand that family life can be busy, but we cannot overstate how important this practise is. It helps children build confidence and mastery, giving them the tools they need to excel.

We also want to share with you an exciting development at St. Mary's: a significant investment in a programme designed to develop speaking and listening skills. We have observed that some children are struggling to form clear sentences, describe simple events, and use the vocabulary needed to explain their ideas. To support your child's progress in this area, here are a few simple yet impactful ideas for you to try at home:

- Set aside a few minutes each day for uninterrupted conversation: Ask openended questions like "What was the best part of your day?" or "What happened next?" to encourage your child to express themselves in more detail.
- Create stories together: Take turns making up a story, each person adding a sentence. This helps build vocabulary and sentence structure.
- Extend their responses: If your child gives a short answer, gently extend it. For example, if they say, "I saw a dog," respond with, "What did the dog look like? Was it big or small?" This encourages them to elaborate.

When I recently wrote to Year 6 parents about the potential risks of unrestricted access to smart technology, I was heartened by the positive response. It reminded me



of the wonderful things we can accomplish when we work together, school and home, in partnership.

Please know that this message is written with a deep sense of care and respect. We share the same goal with you: to give your child the very best start in life. While we are fortunate to have a team of experienced and dedicated teachers here

at St. Mary's, we can't do this alone. Your support, whether through reading together, having conversations, practising skills, or simply creating routines, will make an enormous difference in your child's learning journey.
