#### **Oscar Romero** (1917-1980)

Oscar Romero lived in El Salvador in Central America. He was ordained a priest in 1942 and became the Archbishop in 1977.



- He was aware that the wealth of the country was in the hands of a small number of families.
- He saw that the vast majority of people lived in great poverty.
- He knew that the poor lived in hovels made of cardboard and corrugated sheeting, without running water or electricity.

In 1979, the Revolutionary Government Junta gained power. They were ruthless in their treatment of the poor. Basic human rights were ignored as the army carried out a brutal regime against the civilian population. Hundreds of people



disappeared, were beaten, imprisoned without trial or killed. Priests and nuns were tortured and murdered for showing sympathy for the poor. Archbishop Romero spoke out on behalf of the people. Even though public meetings were forbidden, he encouraged public

demonstrations. He demanded explanations from the government about the murder of certain priests. He called on Church leaders to become the voice of the poor. He said:

> "The world that the Church must serve is the world of the poor. Persecution of the Church is the result of defending the poor".

It was very clear to all that the Archbishop was on the side of the poor and those suffering injustice. He even opened his own official residence to the refugees and those hunted for doing good. He allowed a radio station to be set up in the office of the cathedral. It broadcast reports of the unjust actions of the government and the powerful wealthy class.



Each Sunday, huge crowds gathered for the Mass celebrated by the Archbishop and his sermon was broadcast on the radio. The government and the military were extremely worried. This Archbishop was preaching about the rights of the poor.

Archbishop Romero had known for some time that his life was in danger. About two months before his death he wrote in a Mexican newspaper:

"My life has been threatened many times. I have to confess that, as a Christian, I don't believe in death without resurrection...



As a shepherd, I am obliged to give my life for those I love, for the entire

Salvadorian people, including those who threaten to assassinate me."

Archbishop Romero was murdered in March 1980 as he was celebrating Mass. At the consecration, a shot rang out and he was killed instantly. The spirit of Oscar Romero lives on today in the Salvadorian people: they continue to struggle against injustice and oppression as he did. His courage and determination continue to be a source of strength and hope for all. Archbishop Romero was beatified on 23 May 2015.

#### Martin Luther King (1929 - 1968)

Martin Luther King was a black Baptist minister. He was a prophetic voice for all the black people in America who were being treated as second-class citizens. He dreamed of a better world and worked hard to create it. As a Christian, he saw his work as a mission from God.



In many southern states of the USA, black Americans were segregated (kept apart) from white people. They had to go to separate schools, sit in different parts of buses and restaurants, use different toilets and water fountains. Many black people did not have the right to vote.

#### **Civil Rights**

Martin Luther King led a civil rights movement to change these injustices regarding sectarianism. Thousands of people, black and white, young and old, joined him in protest marches and suffered the violence that was used against them. They were beaten and kicked, had police dogs and fire hoses turned on them. Many were arrested and put in prison. Martin Luther King told his supporters to stand up for what was right. However, no matter what happened, they were never to use violence. He reminded them of what Jesus said:

"Love your enemies. Bless those who curse you. Pray for those who treat you badly."

In 1963, Martin Luther King led a march to Washington DC demanding freedom and jobs.

A vast crowd heard his most inspiring speech:

"I have a dream that one day men will rise up and come to see that they are made to live together as brothers.



	I still have a dream this morning that one day every Negro in this country, every coloured person in the world, will be judged on the basis of the content of his character rather than on the colour of his skin, and every man will respect the dignity and worth of human personality.I still have a dream today that one day justice will roll down like water and righteousness like a mighty stream.Image: Coloured person in the struggle for civil rights was successful.Image: The struggle for civil rights was successful.Seregation was made illegal. Black people won the right to vote. The laws changed but some people still had hatred in their hearts. Martin Luther King was shot and killed by a white racist in 1968. He gave his life in the struggle for equality. His birthday on 15 January is now a public holiday in the United States.

	Neil was born on August 5, in Ohio.

1947	Neil goes to college
	Neil Armstrong joined the US Navy, and he attended Purdue on scholarship. He studied aeronautical engineering.
1949	Neil goes to war
	Neil Armstrong was called into action with the Navy to go fight in the Korean War. When that ended, he returned to college.
1952	Neil Armstrong joins NASA
	After returning from the war, Neil began working with the organization that would later be called NASA.
1956	Neil gets married
	Neil married a lady named Janet Shearon in 1956.

962	Neil joins the astronaut program
	In 1962, Neil moved his family to Texas so he could work with the astronaut program.
966	Neil goes to space
	Neil and his flight mate, David Scott, were launched into space to dock with the Gemini Agena vehicle. The dock was successful, but the mission had to be cut short.
969	The moon mission
	Neil Armstrong, along with two other astronauts, landed on the moon. Armstrong drove the Lunar Module.
969	Neil is awarded for his efforts
	Armstrong and his flight mates received many awards for their moon mission. Awards included the Medal of Freedom and the Congressional Space Medal of Honor.
971	Armstrong leaves NASA
	Neil left NASA to become a professor in Ohio, at the University of Cincinnati.
1986	Neil Armstrong the investigator
	Neil helped investigate the failed space mission, the Challenger, in 1986. The Challenger blew up after launch, killing its crew.
2006	Neil Armstrong on 60 Minutes
	Neil liked to have his privacy, and he stayed out of the public eye for years. In 2006 he gave a TV interview on 60 Minutes, and later that year his biography came out.
2010	Armstrong speaks out
	In 2010, President Barack Obama made cuts to the space program. Neil Armstrong publically spoke out against this decision.
2012	Neil Armstrong dies
	Neil died at the age of 82, after complications from heart surgery. His contribution to the space program, and our understanding of outer space, can't be measured. He will always be remembered for his giant step for mankind.


