 Take part in a daily maths lesson each day at whiterosemaths.com. This week's topic is Building 9 and 10 Week 1. Practise counting up to 10 or 20. This can be done through playing hide and seek, singing number songs, chanting, board games etc. Write out the numerals 0 – 20. Practise recognising amounts up to five or up to ten by playing these games. This can be done by reading a dice when playing board games, playing with cards, identifying how many food items on the plate etc. Sing Number songs to practice counting, reciting numbers in order, one more, one less using number songs: Five Little Ducks, Five Little Men, Ter Green Bottles 	 Children to read to parents daily. Visit Oxford Owl for free eBooks that link to your child's reading level. You can create a free account. Your child can also complete the linked Play activities for each book. There are also Read Write Inc resources that you can access on this website. Visit https://www.phonicsplaycomics.co.uk for a range of decodable comics for children to read. With your child, look in magazines, newspapers and books for the red words they are currently learning. They could use a highlighter to highlight in magazines and newspapers.  Daily phonics - Practise your speed sounds and red words. Daily Read Write Inc phonics lessons are available on Youtube via the link www.ruthmiskin.com Practice the sounds your child is working on and blend words. This can be oral blending (e.g. spoken out loud c-a-t) or writter if appropriate. Interactive phonics games are available on www.phonicsplay.co.uk Watch an Alphablocks episode each day at: CBeebies. Here you will also find a range of games. activities and advice for parents. Visit Mr Mc Phonics: Phase 2 - YouTube for a selection of fun phonics videos. 	 Practice name writing. Can they write their first name? Middle name? Surname? Practice forming the letters of the alphabet. Ask your child to write out the red words they are working on at the moment on pieces of paper and turn them into a pairs game. The red words that we have learned so far are: love, the, was, you, of, be, my, no. your, so, we, said, are, all, they, do. Draw an animal of your choice. Label the parts of the animal. You could create a fact file e.g. where does it live? What does it eat?

Learning Activities Week 7 - Animals - to be done throughout the week

Below are a selection of activities linked to the theme of 'Animals'. Please feel free to choose whichever activities will suit your child best. There is no expectation to complete all of the activities . You could also come up with some of your own activities linked to animals if you like!

- Read the story 'Dear Zoo' or watch the online video Dear Zoo
 - Visit the book's website and play the <u>interactive games</u>.
 - Add your own animal into the story and label it e.g. So they sent me a. hedgehog, but he was
 too prickly...so I sent him back
 - Choose a soft toy animal or small animal figure and create a junk modelled container for it.
- Identify the birds in your garden-
 - Use the <u>RSPB</u> bird identifier website
 - Draw a picture of the birds you can see. Can you label each bird? You could create a tally chart and count how many of each bird you see.
- Play animal charades-
 - $^\circ$ Take it in turns to act as different animals. Add in noises as a clue...
- Learn the song. The animals went in two by two
 - Ask your child to draw out two of each animal and practice writing the numeral 2. How many animals are there altogether? Can you write any animal equations? eg 2 monkeys + 2 lions = 4.
- Looking after your pet-
 - If you have a pet at home encourage your child to take part in their daily care. They could help feed, groom and clear up after your pet.
- Big and small animals-
 - Draw as many big animals as you can on one piece of paper and as many small animals as you can on another sheet of paper. Some children may be able to write a list as an alternative.
- Find all of the animal books in your house-
 - Ask your child to look through the books in your house and to find any with animals on the front cover. Ask them to sort the books into groups of their choice e.g. animals that can fly, swim, big, small, live on a farm/ at the zoo.
- Create an animal den-
 - Provide your child with blankets and sheets to make an animal den. Act out being an animal in the den.

Week 7 RE_ - The parable of the unforgiving debtor

Adult led focus activity – Read story and ask questions

Parable of the unforgiving debtor: Dan won't forgive (adapted Matt. 18:23-31)

This is a story that Jesus told about someone who forgot to be kind.

Once upon a time, there was a man called Dan who owed a lot of money to the king. One day, the king asked Dan to come to the palace.

"You owe me lots of money." the king said. "You must pay up at once!"

"I can't pay!" said Dan. He knelt down and begged the king not to make him pay the money. The king was very kind and he let Dan off paying the money. Dan was very pleased and he went out of the palace. On the way home, he met a friend called Joel who owed him money.

"Pay me the money you owe me!" he shouted.

Dan forgot that the king had been kind to him. He forgot to be kind to Joel.



Suggestions for questions

- Why did the king ask Dan to come to the palace?
- What did the king say to Dan?
- What did Dan do then?
- What kind of a person was the king? Why?
- Who did Dan meet on his way home?
- What did he say to him?
- What had Dan forgotten?
- · What should he have done?

Suggestions for follow up activities

- · Retell the story: Dan won't forgive.
- Make a chart of all the kind deeds children did during the week.
- · Children could make a picture of someone they have been kind to and say what they did.

Explore weighing and measuring food on the kitchen scales. Ask, what happens as you place more on the scales? Look for numerals on packaging you find around the house.  Daily phonics - Practise your speed sounds and red words. Daily Read Write Inc phonics lessons are available on Youtube via the link www.ruthmiskin.com Watch an Alphablocks episode each day at: CBeebies. Here you will also find a range of games. Activities and advice for parents. Visit Mr Mc Phonics: Phase 2 - YouTube for a selection of fun phonics videos. Pour flour. rice or lentils into a shallow tray or plate. Show your child a letter. digraph. trigraph or tricky word and ask them to 'write it' in the food using their finger. 	 Practice name writing. Can they write their first name? Middle name? Surname? Practice forming the letters of the alphabet. Using recipes from books as a guide, ask your child to create their own recipe for their dream meal. They could draw out the ingredients and label them and draw the finished meal. Some children may be able to write a few short sentences as instructions. Look at a range of different packages found around the kitchen. Discuss with your child what makes it stand out to a customer: Support them to design a package for a treat of their choice. 		

Learning Activities Week 3 – Food - to be done throughout the week

Below are a selection of activities linked to the theme of Food'. Please feel free to choose whichever activities will suit your child best. There is no expectation to complete all of the activities. You could also come up with some of your own activities linked to food if you like!

- Healthy/ Unhealthy-
 - Provide your child with a selection of items from your kitchen cupboards. Can they sort them
 into things that are healthy and unhealthy? Discuss why the food is good for you or bad for
 you. Look at the <u>Eatwell plate</u> to help figure out which foods they should eat a lot of or not
 very much of.
 - Discuss how exercise is an important part of staying healthy. Watch and complete a 10
 minute <u>shake up</u>.
- 5 a day-
 - Support your child to create a food diary to record how many pieces of fruit and vegetables they eat in a day. They could write these using their phonics knowledge or draw a picture of each item.
- Create a collage-
 - Ask your child to draw out a number of fruits or vegetables, large enough to fill a piece of A4 paper. Provide them with a selection of colourful packaging. Can they cut out and stick on to their picture to create a collage?
- Play shops-
 - Using toy food or old packaging, set up a food shop for your child to act out being the shopkeeper and customer. You could introduce coins to support their developing knowledge of money. Can they write price labels for the items of food in the shop? Give them a notepad to use as a shopping list to encourage in the moment writing.
- Potato/ Vegetable Printing-
 - Using a selection of vegetables available in your kitchen, support your child to print and explore the shapes and patterns created:







• Make comflour gloop-

• Mix complour with a small amount of water in a mixing bowl. It will make a slimy, stretchy mixture. Allow your child to explore the change of texture from wet to dry and the texture of the gloop.

Week 8 RE - The story of Zacchaeus

Adult led focus activity - Read the story to your child and ask questions

Today, we are going to listen to a story about someone Jesus helped to say sorry.

Zacchaeus was a greedy man

Jesus and his disciples were visiting a town. In this town there lived a man called Zacchaeus. Now, Zacchaeus had a job which he did every day. His job was to collect money from people. But there was a problem. Zacchaeus often did something wrong. He took too much money.



When Zacchaeus heard that Jesus was coming

through the town, he wanted to see him. He had heard a lot about Jesus. But lots of other people wanted to see Jesus as well. Zacchaeus couldn't see over their heads. He was too short. [You might like to pause here to discuss this with children who will know how it feels.]

Then Zacchaeus had a brilliant idea. He could climb up a tree. Then he would be able to see over everyone's heads. He would be able to see Jesus! So that's what he did.

When Jesus got to the place where the tree was, he looked up and saw Zacchaeus. Jesus knew that Zacchaeus had been taking too much money from people. He knew Zacchaeus needed to say sorry. He knew Zacchaeus needed help.



"Come down from that tree, Zacchaeus," Jesus called, "I

want to come to your house today!" Everyone was very surprised, especially Zacchaeus. He climbed down really quickly and hurried home to get everything ready. When Jesus came into his house, Zacchaeus knew what he had to do. He stood up and spoke to everyone.



"I'm sorry," he said. "I've taken too much money from all of

you. But I'm going to give it all back now. I'm going to give some money to poor people as well."

Suggestions for questions:

- · What kind of work did Zacchaeus do?
- What did he do that was wrong?
- Why do you think he did this?
- What did he do when he heard that Jesus was coming through the town?
- Was it a good idea to climb a tree? Why?
- What would you have done if you were there?
- What did Jesus do when he arrived?
- What did he say to Zacchaeus?
- How do you think Zacchaeus was feeling?
- · After meeting Jesus what did Zacchaeus do?
- What did Zacchaeus do to put things right and show he really was sorry?
- Do you think he could have done this without the help of Jesus?

Suggestions for follow up areas of learning


• Talk about the various ways to say 'sorry'. Ask your child if they can tell you of other ways of saying 'sorry'. You might want to give examples, "I didn't mean to hurt you", "I was wrong there".

• Ask the children to draw a picture that reminds them of Jesus. They can display it where it can be seen to remind them that Jesus is always with them.


Phonics speed sounds to practise daily with your child.
